

HOW TO BE AN OUTSTANDING PLAYER

PLAN

Develop a flexible plan which establishes priorities and helps you act thoughtfully and knowingly.

Desire to be successful.

Set short and long term goals. Revise and redesign. Determine what needs work. Budget time to achieve your goals.

PRACTICE

A well-prepared part is something you bring to rehearsal – not something you develop in rehearsal.

Nobody knows what you cannot play better than you.

Take action to be successful. Physical activity. Build muscle and musical memory. Repetition. Develop your **craft**. Develop consistency. Work on what you cannot play. Use a metronome.

REHEARSE

You do not come to rehearsal to learn your part. You come to learn everyone else's.

Doing things together that cannot be done alone.

Directed listening and adjusting. Discover the composer's intent. Listen critically. Search for the implied meaning. Solve group problems. Evaluate during the process. Ensemble is the audience.

PERFORM

Present a gift that comes from the heart and inspires the soul.

Culmination of study and experience.

Spontaneous creation. Focus and target attention. Non-stop energy flow. Learning is more intuitive. Self-monitored listening and adjusting. Formal environment with outside audience.

Goals and Expectations:

The goal of the Vero Beach High School Orchestra Program is to provide a comprehensive orchestra performance experience. We will perform a wide array of music consisting of orchestral repertoire, terminology, techniques, and composers. Playing in the orchestra will enhance your technical development on your individual instrument while teaching you the essentials of quality musicianship. You will learn about musical time periods, their composers, and the stylistic traits of different genres. Each member of the orchestra is expected to contribute their musical skills to the best of their abilities. Because an orchestra is a team of musicians, strong leadership, individual responsibility, and appropriate rehearsal etiquette is expected at all times. We will be successful if every member follows these *five simple rules:*

- Always exhibit appropriate rehearsal etiquette. Students will be held to the highest standards of attitude and behavior. Disrespect shown to peers, directors, guests, and audiences will not be tolerated. Behavior infractions will be dealt with the by the direct, parents, and if necessary, school administration. Speak or play your instrument only when you have been instructed to do so.
- ▶ Be on time to daily rehearsals and concerts and come prepared with all materials. Remember that to be early is to be on time, and to be on time is to be late. As a musician, you need time to unpack, tune, and warm up before rehearsals and performances start. Bring the materials you need your instrument, music, and a pencil and not the ones you don't cell phones, work for another class, food/drink (except bottled water), and other distractions.
- **PRACTICE.** It's *our* performance on the line, not yours. Please do not waste valuable rehearsal time because you haven't practiced your part. Follow instructions the first time they are given, and mark your music without being asked.
- Follow the attendance policy. Attendance (unexcused absence in any class) below 90% will make you ineligible to perform. Scheduling conflicts must be communicated with the director as far in advance as possible.
- No gum, food, or candy in the Orchestra room or PAC. No horseplay in the buildings. See addendum for a full list of Orchestra rules.

Discipline: Discipline issues will be handled in accordance with the VBHS discipline policy.

Grading:

Grades will be determined from the following criteria:

- ▶ Individual performance skills (scales, excerpts, and musicianship projects)
- Active participation and proper materials present and utilized
- ▶ Practical application of repertoire (rehearsals and performances)
- *▶ Accent* assignments

Grading Policy for After-School Rehearsals and Concert Attendance:

The Orchestra performance calendar is on the Orchestra website and in this handbook. Mark ALL of these dates on your family calendars and agenda books immediately. You are receiving these dates early so you can plan all activities, doctor and dentist appointments, family vacations, and other events accordingly. Students involved in other school related activities need to check practice schedules, game/playoff schedules, etc. in order to take care of any potential conflicts AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. Most of the time, these conflicts can be resolved as long as they are noticed early. There are certain, specific circumstances in which I may excuse a student from an after-school rehearsal because of a school related activity, pending all appropriate and reasonable venues for resolving the conflict have been exhausted to my satisfaction and in a timely manner.

Students are expected to stay for the entire rehearsal or performance. Students will receive grades for every after-school and evening rehearsal and performance. Students who are absent, tardy, or leave early for any unexcused reason may receive a low grade or a zero. Students who have after-school jobs are expected to communicate with their employer and request that their work schedules be arranged to accommodate all rehearsals and performances. Employers should be informed that Orchestra is a class, not an extracurricular activity. After-school rehearsals and concerts are a required part of the class.

Attendance Policy:

- **▶** Attendance at all rehearsals and concerts is mandatory.
- Description Excused absences must be preapproved, except for a medical or family emergency.
- A follow-up note, signed by a parent and/or doctor, is required for excused absences.
- See the absence form for a list of make-up options. Make-up assignments are required in order to receive credit for work missed. Absence form must be submitted at least two school days in advance except in case of emergencies.
- Appropriate concert attire must be worn at concerts, including shoes, or you may not be permitted to perform, resulting in a zero for the performance grade.
- Musicians who are not musically ready for a concert may be asked to "sit-out" and will be required to complete a make-up assignment of the teacher's choosing.
- Full performance credit will be given only to those students who arrive no later than the assigned call time, perform at the required performance standard, dress in accordance with the assigned code, behave in a professional manner, and remain in attendance until the completion of the performance.

Excused absences from a performance include:

- The student is too ill to attend school. Parents/guardians should send a written note to the director as soon as possible (including the day of the event). This ensures that the director will be able to fill the holes and reconfigure parts as needed. Students who were present at school on both the day of the after-school event and also the day after the event will not be excused without a note from the doctor.
- There is a death in the family or comparable family emergency. Parents/guardians should send a written note to the director as soon as possible. If the student's family crisis is a death in the family or comparable, the student will be exempt from making up the grade. (Please do not think it necessary to communicate with the director while the emergency is ongoing. Take care of yourself and your family first. Communicate when you can.)
- The student has a prior commitment. If the student has a prior commitment that was planned before the Orchestra rehearsal or concert was announced, parents/guardians music communicate this conflict using the Absence Form (see page 11).
- **D** Observance of religious holidays. Established religious holidays are excused but should be communicated by the parent/guardian using the Absence Form (see page 11).
- ▶ Other circumstances cleared in advance by the director. Examples include a student who was asked mid-year to be in the bridal party of her sister's wedding or an athlete whose team made it to the state championship game that was not on the regular calendar. In cases like this, parents/guardians must communicate as soon as they foresee the likelihood of a conflict. The concert make-up grade requirement would be the same as any other prior commitment.

Reasons NOT accepted as excused include:

- Detention, suspension, family or personal vacations, sports or other activities outside of school (leagues, etc), attending another concert, sporting events, parties or other entertainment events, forgetting, minor ailments.
- ▶ Students who need to make up or retake assignments for another class should not miss Orchestra events to do so. It is not acceptable to come to the director the day of the event and ask to be excused from all or part of the event. Being absent or arriving late will result in a lowered grade and may prevent the student from being allowed to participate in the concert.
- > Verbal or written statements from students are not excused.

NOTE: Concert attendance accounts for a large portion of your quarterly grade. An unexcused absence from a concert receives a zero and will automatically lower your grade. Excused absences requiring a make-up assignment will also be marked as a zero in the gradebook until the make-up assignment has been submitted.

Concert Attire:

Male: All black - black long sleeved button up shirt, black dress pants, black socks, and black dress shoes

Female: All black - Orchestra blouse, black from the waist down to the ankles (black pants, floor length black skirt, or skirt with black leggings/stocking/tights down to the feet), black **closed-toe dress** shoes

Acceptable Jewelry: Stud earrings only. Fine necklace with a single pendant or pearl necklace. Only fine or thin metal single bracelet. Studs and cuff links for the tuxedo shirt.

Unacceptable Jewelry: Large earrings, hoop earrings, drop earrings, and any other large flashy jewelry. Plastic bracelets and snap bands are banned as are large chain necklaces or multiple pendants.

Instruments:

Students are responsible for their instrument at all times. When not in use, your instrument must be <u>locked</u> in its locker. There are a limited number of school instruments available for rental for a <u>\$75 instrument maintenance fee</u>. Please pay your instrument fee to "VBOB" or use the website, https://vbhsorch.square.site/s/shop. Any damage or loss incurred to the instrument by the student will be the student's responsibility. At the end of the school year, the instrument will be inspected for damages or loss, and the appropriate amount will be assessed. If necessary, a bill for the damages will be mailed to the user's home.

However, I highly recommend that students rent from a reputable music store. Most music stores do a rent-to-own program and allow you to put the money accrued towards the purchase of either the rented instrument or a "step-up" instrument. Even if your child does not continue playing after high school, you can always sell the instrument to regain some of your initial investment.

Please be careful of where you purchase an instrument. While online deals with places like Amazon or Wish seem great, the instruments are usually poor quality. These instruments are difficult to tune and do not stay in tune for long. They also make it difficult for any player to make a quality sound. String instruments are difficult enough to learn, so the least we can do is find an affordable quality string instrument that is easy to tune and makes a good tone when played correctly. If you need help in purchasing a quality instrument, please contact the director.

Instrument Care:

String instruments are only made out of wood! Please handle them carefully. Instruments should not be left in a car for any period of time. If the instrument gets too hot, the varnish will boil and the instrument then becomes stuck to the case. If it gets too cold, the wood will crack. Both of these problems are expensive to fix. Avoid having to pay for this by not leaving the instrument in the car for any period of time for any reason. Keeping the instrument away from an air vent or drafty windows/doors is also good.

- Purchase rosin, a cleaning cloth, and a good quality set of spare strings
- ▶ Bows should be rehaired at least once a year
- Violins and Violas: You must use a shoulder rest
- ▶ Cellos and Basses: You must use a rock stop or strap
- A metronome and a music stand are highly recommended for home. There are plenty of free metronome apps!
- ▶ High quality strings are a must! Dominant, Helicore, Spirocore, and Evah Pirazzi are examples of good quality strings. Also, strings should be changed once per year. Fresh strings will greatly improve the tone quality of your instrument. Please do not buy strings from Amazon. There are many fakes out there designed to look exactly like the brand you normally buy. Only buy from reputable places such as Shar Music or Southwest Strings.

Lab Fee:

A \$50 lab fee is needed for our orchestra to operate at a high level. This fee only covers a portion of what is spent on each student during the year. This allows us to purchase and maintain our uniforms, purchase and provide sheet music, pay MPA fees, provide meals for many events throughout the year, and provide awards for students at the banquet. Please make your check out to "VBOB." Your address and phone number (with area code) must be on the check. Please pay at the parent meeting where a receipt will be written.

Lab fee alone = \$50 Lab fee + instrument maintenance fee = \$50 + \$75 = \$125

Sheet Music:

One of our largest expenditures each year is high-quality music literature. The parts assigned to students must be cared for and kept in school-assigned folders. Practice copies will be provided as needed. Students are responsible for numbering the measures on each piece of sheet music. Music in rehearsal and performance folders must remain in the folder. Students in need of music must consult the librarian more than five minutes before the beginning of rehearsal. Organize your practice music.

Private Lessons:

Private lesson teachers tailor a regiment that is specific to your developing needs as a musician. Students enrolled in private lesson study accelerate their musical development and become better players. If you need help finding a good private lesson teacher, ask the other students in your section or see the director for recommendations.

Seating:

Orchestra is a unified team effort, and all students, no matter where they sit, are equally important. Stands may rotate within all sections for specific pieces, daily rehearsals, or performances throughout the year. Periodic performance assessments may alter seating. A permanent seating change may be made because of persistent talking and/or poor rehearsal etiquette.

Orchestra Trips:

These are all considered a privilege, and students must meet all performance, attendance, and behavior expectations in order to take part. They must also meet the minimum eligibility requirements as set by the school district. The entire trip is a school activity, and all school rules apply for the duration of the trip.

Solo & Ensemble MPA:

All students in Philharmonic are required to perform a solo. Concert Orchestra students in the Orchestra 5 and 6 Honors sections are also required to perform a solo. S&E is optional for all other students. Solo grades will be entered in the gradebook as a test grade. Students may also prepare an additional ensemble (duet, trio, quartet, etc.). See addendum for the Solo & Ensemble form, which is due Nov. 5. MPA is at IRCHS on Saturday, Dec. 4. Excused absences should be cleared in advance. Students with an excused absence will be required to perform for Mr. Shuping.

Accent Assignment

One (1) accent assignment is to be completed each quarter. Choose one of the following:

- a. Perform a Living Room Concert for your family or friends. At least one adult must be present. Perform 3-4 pieces you know well at each concert. One piece must be a **solo**, and the rest can be of your choosing. Turn in a completed Living Room Concert form.
- b. Participate on your orchestra instrument in a non-school-related musical group (church orchestra, perform in a retirement home, community orchestra, etc.). Bring in a signed note from a parent.
- c. Attend a concert and turn in the program after the concert. All concerts must be approved by your director.
- d. Take regular private lessons on your instrument.
- e. Write a 500 word, grammatically correct essay on the history of your instrument. This may only be done once.
- f. Write a 500 word grammatically correct essay about a virtuoso performer on your instrument.
- g. Write a 500 word grammatically correct essay about a piece of music we have/are studying.
- h. Listen to a complete album (must be approved by director) and write a review, including summary on each tune.

- 1. Food, Drinks, Gum, and Candy are not allowed in any rehearsal hall or locker room. *The first floor hallways may be used as eating areas during second lunch ONLY*.
- 2. Hats may not be worn during rehearsal.
- 3. Cell phones and other electronic devices may only be used with permission during rehearsal.
- 4. Students are only allowed in the orchestra room during periods in which they have a scheduled orchestra class. *Do not ask your other teachers for a pass to building four.*
- 5. Students are not permitted to "hang out" in the orchestra office, uniform room, and practice rooms. *Practice rooms are for practicing only. Students must have permission from the director to use the practice rooms*.
- 6. Building 4 doors are to be closed at all times. Students are **NOT** to prop open doors.
- 7. Students have 2 minutes from the sound of the tardy bell to be in their seat with their instrument, music, and pencil. *Shuttle bus students have 3 minutes from the time the bus arrives*.
 - Students are required to have their instrument in rehearsal each day
 - Students are required to have their music folder with music in rehearsal each day
 - Students are required to have a pencil in rehearsal each day
- 8. All students in each class period are required to set up the room for rehearsal each day.
- 9. All classes required to rack all chairs and stands each day.

Vero Beach High School Orchestra Parent/Guardian and Student Participation Agreement

As a member or parent/guardian of a member of the VBHS Orchestra Program, we agree to follow all policies stated in this handbook and agree to the following:

We do hereby agree and grant full permission for my student to fully participate in the VBHS Orchestra.

We agree to fully support my student's membership in the VBHS Orchestra and agree that both the parent(s)/guardian(s) and my student will abide by all VBHS Orchestra policies as stated in the official Orchestra Handbook and the School District of Indian River County policies as stated in the SDIRC Code of Conduct. We are also agreeing to follow the policies stated in this agreement.

We grant permission for digital pictures, audio, and video recordings of my student to be posted on the VBHS Orchestra website/social media platforms and to be released to community publications.

We also acknowledge and understand the IRCSB policies regarding hazing, social media, and consent for random drug testing and agree to those terms. We agree that the Bullying/Hazing Form, Social Media Form, and District Drug Testing Policy must be signed and on file with the Orchestra office.

We understand and agree that participation in Orchestra is a YEARLONG commitment and agree that my student will fully participate. Neither I nor my student will ask for a schedule change or to "drop out" of Orchestra after the first week of school.

We agree and understand that all activities of the Orchestra including rehearsals, performances, field trips, meetings, and other activities as listed on the Orchestra calendar are mandatory unless the student's absence is approved. THEREFORE, we pledge that my student will attend all events and activities as posted and as updated on the VBHS Orchestra calendar.

We understand and agree that any student who fails to adhere to the policies and rules laid out in this handbook and the SDIRC Code of Conduct is not in good standing and is therefore ineligible for any awards or recognition at the Orchestra awards ceremony and may be removed from Orchestra leadership positions.

We agree that Vero Beach High School and the School District of Indian River County are not responsible for any damage to instruments or property owned by the student or parent that may occur at any official Orchestra function.

We agree to hold harmless and release Vero Beach High School (VBHS), Vero Beach High School Orchestras, the School District of Indian River County (SDIRC), their employees, agents, or representatives for and from any accidents, injuries, or other medical conditions that may occur as a result of my student's participation in the Orchestra program or Orchestra related activities and events. We further release, waive, and discharge VBHS, VBHS Orchestra, SDIRC, their employees, agents, representatives (including but not limited to Orchestra parents and/or volunteers) and any other persons or entities connected to or affiliated with in any way, shape, or form with VBHS, SDIRC, and the VBHS Orchestra from any and all liability, loss, damage, or any claim on account of any injuries including death to my child/ward or said child's/ward's property whether caused by the negligence of my child/ward, any release or otherwise, and I expressly release all releases from any and all acts of their own negligence or fault, whether said negligence or fault be in their individual capacity, a representative capacity, or in connection with any negligence or fault of others. Parents/guardians, further agree to indemnify and hold harmless releases and each of them for any loss, liability, damage or cost, including reasonable attorney's fees, that releases may incur if any legal action is taken by or against my child/ward or me as a result of my child's participation in Orchestra related activities at or on behalf of Vero Beach High School. We agree that this release is intended to be as broad and inclusive as permitted by the laws of the State of Florida and that if any portion of this release is held invalid, it is agreed that the balance of this release shall, notwithstanding, continue in full force and legal effect.

We agree that it is the responsibility of the student to give the hard copy of this handbook provided by Mr. Shuping to the parents/guardians. It is our responsibility to read and understand all policies as stated in the VBHS Orchestra handbook and agree to participate in all required events.

We acknowledge that a copy of the VBHS Orchestra Handbook and the VBHS Orchestra Calendar can be located on the Orchestra website, www.verobeachorchestra.com, and that it is our responsibility to be fully informed and aware of the contents of said handbook and calendar including periodic updates throughout the year.

We are aware that it is our responsibility to keep our information updated in Charms as it is the main communication method for the VBHS Orchestra program. It is our responsibility to request written copies of communications if we do not have access to e-mail.
